Sir James Gobbo Legacy Fellowship Application guidelines

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Introduction

The International Specialised Skills Institute (ISS Institute) is offering one (1) Sir James Gobbo Legacy Fellowship in the amount of \$10,000.

Applications are open between 27 October - 11 November 2022

The 2022 Sir James Gobbo Legacy Fellowship provides an opportunity for young people to acquire higher-level skills and drive leading practice and innovation in Australia. It is intended that the Fellowship applicants will demonstrate potential benefits for, and application in, Australia.

Applications should focus on the following areas:

- Conservation
- Heritage trades
- Artisan skills
- Italian language and culture.

Ideally, Fellows would undertake an immersion activity in a organisation that is aligned to one of the above areas. Preference will be given to candidates who will be traveling to Italy as part of their Fellowship. The ISS Institute will undertake to assist in making relevant Italian connections where necessary and/or possible. However, if you have an innovative Fellowship proposal that sits outside these areas, or if you intend to travel to other destinations, the application will also be considered.

The Sir James Gobbo Legacy Fellowship

The ISS Institute was founded in 1991 by Sir James Gobbo, former Governor of Victoria, to encourage investment in the development of Australia's specialised skills. In the wake of Sir James Gobbo's passing, a Fellowship has been created to uphold his legacy. The Sir James Gobbo Legacy Fellowship seeks to support rare and heritage skills, by assisting candidates who require further training overseas in order to build best practice and to further establish themselves here in Australia.

What is International Applied Research?

Applied research is an approach used to solve practical problems. The study and research is often used in education, training and across industries with the intention to generate actionable knowledge, to find solutions or develop innovative practice that has direct applications to the world. ISS Institute's Fellowship Program invests in Australians undertaking a form of applied research outside of Australia.

What are Skill Enhancements?

Skill enhancements are opportunities to develop skills, advance knowledge and identify innovation. Fellowships allow individuals to enhance their skills for the benefit of organisations and industries in Australia. Fellowships provide opportunities to identify problems or skill gaps in Australia, enable Fellows to identify best-practice ways of addressing these and provide detailed recommendations so that innovative or new approaches can be implemented in industry.

How to apply for this Fellowship?

To apply for this Fellowship you are required to:

- Complete the application form
- Provide a current curriculum vitae (resume)
- Provide 1 x letter of support which indicates that your Fellowship field is relevant and will benefit the industry (eg. peak industry bodies, government agencies, professional associations)
- Provide 1 x employer endorsement letter (unless you are self-employed) indicating that you will be supported to meet the obligations associated with this Fellowship (this letter should be from your CEO, Director or Manager).

Who can apply?

- Australian residents aged between 18 35 years.
- Residents with Australian citizenship or permanent residency located anywhere in Australia.

What does a Fellowship involve?

- Fellows must use their awarded funds to undertake applied international research.
- Fellowship research may include meeting knowledgeable leaders, conducting interviews, observation, immersion in workplaces, undertaking specialised training or attending specialist conferences.
- Fellows must manage their Fellowship funds personally to arrange their international activities.
- Fellows must prepare a formal Fellowship Report documenting findings and recommendations for industry/skills enhancement in Australia within **12 months** of receiving their Fellowship. ISS Institute will assist with the editing, design and publication of this Fellowship Report.
- Fellows participate in a Fellowship Induction Program and are proudly supported by ISS Institute staff throughout the Fellowship period (and beyond).
- Fellows must arrange for time off work with their employer to undertake the overseas applied research component of their Fellowship. While the Fellowship is being awarded to the individual and not their employer, it is important that the employer supports the individual's application and will enable to individual to meet Fellowship obligations.
- Fellows will be supported throughout their Fellowship by the ISS Institute team.

Selection Process

- Each submission will be evaluated by The ISS Institute team and/or board members, who may draw upon specialist experts when evaluating applications.
- Short-listed applicants are then interviewed by a Selection Panel, made up of ISS Institute team members.
- Interviews may be conducted in person or by video-conference.
- The Selection Panel's decision is final and binding, and given the number of applications we receive we are unable to provide feedback on individual applications.
- Each applicant will be advised of the outcome of their application.

Conditions of Entry

- 1. Fellowship application (including the attachments curriculum vitae, 1 x letter of support, 1 x employer endorsement letter) must be received by the ISS Institute by the closing date.
- 2. The duration of the applied research component varies depending on the aims of the Fellowship (done on a case by case basis).

- 3. Successful applicants will enter into a contractual agreement with ISS Institute to ensure that all Fellowship requirements are met.
- 4. Fellows must prepare a detailed Fellowship Report outlining their international research, findings and recommendations.
- 5. Fellows agree to disseminate their Fellowship learnings, findings and recommendations to peers, industry leaders and other relevant bodies and report back to the ISS Institute about these.
- 6. Our Fellows agree to be ambassadors of ISS Institute throughout their Fellowship and into the future.
- 7. Our Fellows agree to take part in periodic evaluation, generally via surveys, so we can capture the impact that a Fellowship has had at a personal, professional or industry level over time.
- 8. While Fellowship applicants can be undertaking tertiary studies, the Fellowship cannot be used to gain a tertiary qualification.
- 9. The selection panel decision is final and binding.
- 10. Unsuccessful Fellowship applicants are welcome to apply for a Fellowship in the future.

Preparing your Fellowship Application

What are Letters of Support?

Letters of support indicate that your Fellowship field is relevant and will benefit your industry or sector. Letters of support can come from a peak industry body, industry/sector partner, government agencies, professional associations or key partner. The best letters of support describe how they may support your Fellowship, convey enthusiasm and lend credibility to the need for your Fellowship topic. **Please submit your application through the online form.**

Before approaching individuals who could provide you with a letter of support it is a good idea to make a list of potential supporters. Contact them, preferably over the phone or via email, and ask if they would be willing to provide you with a letter of support. It is a good idea to have a brief summary of your proposed Fellowship and explain how it will benefit your industry or sector when asking for a letter of support.

Don't forget to ask the person to put their letter of support on letterhead, then sign and date it.

What is an Employer Endorsement Letter?

An Employer Endorsement Letter shows that you have discussed your Fellowship Application with your employer (eg. CEO, director or senior manager).

While it is the Fellow, and not the Fellow's employer, who receives the Fellowship it is important that your employer is aware that you are applying for a Fellowship. This ensures that your employer understands you will need to take leave from work (eg. Annual Leave, professional leave etc) to travel overseas, you will be completing a Fellowship report and seeking opportunities to disseminate your Fellowship learnings and findings.

Your employer may also want to assist you while you are developing your Fellowship application and the skill enhancement areas you want to investigate.

Fellowship Application questions guidance

You may want to consider the following tips when preparing responses to each of the Fellowship application questions. Please ensure your answers are as succinct as possible and avoid using industry jargon.

1. Please provide a succinct description of your Fellowship proposal? [Please write in 3rd person]**150** words

Please introduce Fellowship proposal succinctly in a clear and thoughtful way. In many respects this is how you will convey your proposed Fellowship to your employer, those you are seeking letters of support from, and your peers.

2. Please describe the Fellowship area you are involved in (including any links you may have to industry/sector/education bodies if relevant)? Up to 200 words

In this question we are looking to understand your current role/job and how it relates to your Fellowship proposal.

3. Please describe two or more skill enhancement areas related to your proposed Fellowship area you would like to investigate and why? Up to 300 words

In this question we want to understand the areas that you have identified as needed skill enhancements and how these will benefit you and your industry/sector now and into the future. See the Fellowship Guidelines document for more information about skill enhancements.

4. Please discuss the evidence that validates/supports the need for applied research and investigation into the proposed skill enhancement areas? Up to 300 words

In this question you have an opportunity to discuss research undertaken and/or the evidence you have collected which indicates the need for your proposed skill enhancement areas.

5. Which overseas organisations/training programs/conferences/other do you aim to visit and develop connections with and why have you selected these? Up to 200 words

In this question, we don't expect you to have organised a detailed itinerary or travel plan as yet. However, there is an expectation that you will have identified leading practice and skill enhancement opportunities, including where these are located and who is offering them.

6. In what ways do you anticipate that your overseas investigations and findings will positively benefit and have impact on your industry/sector? Up to 300 words

While we know you may not have the answers now, you will have no doubt thought about the ways in which your Fellowship may have a positive influence in Australia and this question is a chance to discuss that. In addition this question provides you with a chance to discuss leading practice occurring overseas but which may not be evident or occurring in Australia.

7. How will taking part in this Fellowship benefit you at personal and/or professional levels? Up to 300 words

In this question we are interested in learning about how this Fellowship might assist you in achieving career goals now and into the future.

8. How do you intend sharing your Fellowship findings and recommendations with the relevant industry, sector and/or other influential areas (such as education, training or government) upon completion of your Fellowship? Up to 200 words

A core component of any Fellowship is disseminating learnings and ideas with colleagues, peers and influential organisations/ individuals. In this question we are interested in learning about who you believe would benefit from the outcomes of your Fellowship and the ways you might share that information. Some dissemination examples include: presentations, conferences, articles, workshops, mentoring, media etc.

9. Have you ever undertaken another Fellowship, awarded by another organisation, that was related to this Fellowship topic? If yes, please describe. 150 words

While you may have undertaken a Fellowship provided by another organisation in the past we prefer that it does not closely resemble this one. However, if this Fellowship application builds upon your previous one, it will still be considered.
